The Struggles of Girls in Pakistan

A religious minority in the Islamic country, Sikh Pakistanis routinely face discrimination from their Muslim countrymen and thus usually band together in small communities like Hassanabdal. The village happens to be the site of a historic Gurdwara, a temple that Pakistani Sikh come to make pilgrimage. Hassanabdal is yet known for one more thing: it is also where WorldHarvest's only school in Pakistan is located.

The Sikh have had a long and storied history in Pakistan. In fact, during the 18th and 19th centuries, they were a powerful political force in the area. Lahore, Pakistan, was the capital of the first Sikh empire. However, after the partition of India in 1947, the majority of Sikh in Pakistan moved to India. Now, only a small percentage remain in Pakistan.

In 2017, WorldHarvest partnered with the Robinson Community Development Ministries (RCDM) School to help educate the underserved and largely forgotten Pakistani Sikh community. The school has been operating in the area since 2005, but only accepted children that could afford the tuition costs. Through the Sponsor-A-Child Program, WorldHarvest has been able to enroll children who would otherwise be unable to afford the tuition. This includes children like Karwinder Kaur.

Don't let the smiling face mislead you; Karwinder has experienced a rough upbringing. She was

only a year old when she lost her father in a terrorist attack. Since then, times have been hard for her, her mother, and her sister. When WorldHarvest began sponsoring Karwinder in 2017, it helped her family greatly. It allowed for her to be supervised while her mother worked during the day and taught her valuable skills that will help her in the long run. She is now in the 3rd grade. She enjoys school, learning, and most importantly her friends. Having a basic education will give her an advantage in Pakistan where many girls never have the opportunity to go to school. That will help her get a job in the future. So far, RCDM has over 100 children just like Karwinder in their roster. Some are currently in need of sponsorship so that they may remain in school and continue their education. Are you willing to help a child in need?

A wonderful example of the help provided to those in need took place on April 20th in the village of Tolonggeru. There, over 60 children were treated to meals of either fried chicken or fish. Included in the meals were vegetables, a variety of fruits, milk, and water. In addition to feeding the youth, they were also given information about how to eat healthy and what foods are the most nutritious. After the meal and training session, all those who attended were given school supplies that

included books, pens, and other educational needs.

The success of the event was seen on the faces of the children who attended. Their happiness was also expressed by the comments of joy they proclaimed for being appreciated and attended to. It was additionally noted that the parents who were there also were positively influenced by the generosity of the WorldHarvest team.

All of the hard work accomplished by the volunteers at WorldHarvest can only become a reality in the lives of others by the generosity of people around the world, like



Nepal Mission Trip

or three weeks this spring, Vice Chairman of WorldHarvest, Dr. Daniel Hanafi of Monrovia, California, Brent Earwicker of Bend, Oregon, and Danny Schultz of Spokane, Washington traveled to several countries in Asia to further the works of WorldHarvest abroad. Their travels took them to Kathmandu, Nepal where they celebrate the opening of our new building. The front of the structure is five stories tall and will house a school and provide a dormitory for the students. The school is built on only 9,000 square feet





of land, with a cost of \$700 thousand dollars, and is mortgage free. Thanks to WorldHarvest partners who contributed majority of the funds needed from purchasing the land to completing the building.

The team then went up into the Himalayans and provided both medical and dental care for the Buddhist monks and people in and around the 600-year-old monastery. Another medical and dental camp was also set up in the suburb of Kathmandu, near WorldHarvest's agricultural/farming area. Nearly 400 patients were treated during those two medical and dental camps while the team was in Nepal.

Summer Mission: Celebrating 30 years of Service in Indonesia



his year marks WorldHarvest's 30th summer mission trip and it is expected to reach thousands of some of the most disadvantaged population in Indonesia. It will take place from July 13th through the 25th and will be joined by 40 medical professionals, businessmen, and students from all over the world. They will go to the southern most part of Indonesia, the province of Nusa Tenggara Timur (NTT), visiting the city of Atambua, Betun, Kefamenanu, Soe, and Kupang. The team will be hosting 8 medical camps, 5 Leadership Seminars for social/religious leaders in each city, 14 youth "No Apologies" Seminars to inspire young people abstain from pre-marital sex.



he NTT province has many serious social problems that have given WorldHarvest the opportunity to come and render assistance. Here are some examples that this area face: economy that is one of the poorest in Indonesia (15% inflation rate, 30% unemployment rate and interest rate as high as 24%); lack of clean drinking water, sanitation, and health facilities that have led to a 7.1% children mortality rate. Of those children who survive, 32% experience severe malnutrition. Stunting, a reduction in human growth development, is also prevalent in the area due to improper diet or lack of food. Rampant drug use that has lead to over 166 children ages 15 to 25 to be infected with HIV/AIDS in the city of Kupang alone. Over 4.000 people are also infected throughout the province of NTT.

Recognizing these tremendous social problems, WorldHarvest has picked NTT to be the focus of this year's Summer Mission. Your financial support through WorldHarvest will directly impact the province of NTT. If you need further information on how you can be involved, please contact our office.
